PROPHETS PRIESTS KINGS - WEEK 5: FAREWELL ADDRESS



TEXTS: 1 SAMUEL 12:1-25

TEACHING & DIALOGUE

Have someone read 1 Samuel 12:1-15 out loud.



A life in Christ is one that is continuing to grow in faith, growing in our view of who God is. God's holiness becomes more and more clear, and our awareness of our sin becomes clearer too. Recognizing this faith is fueled by worship, word and prayer drives us toward God and not away in spite of our growing awareness of just how sinful we really are, and this is just how lesus wants it.

In Samuel's farewell address to the Israelites, he calls attention to their recurring cycle where they forget the Lord and forsake Him through rebellion. They were prone to the influence of the nations around them, as reflected in their request for a king and following after other gods.

- 1. How is Samuel being a good leader and loving his people well? (He is seeking to hold the Israelites accountable to God's expectations of them by reminding them of God's truth and character. As a leader, he has proven integrity. Samuel is loving them well by persevering with them and not ignoring or tolerating their behavior.)
- 2. As much as Samuel was pointing out the pattern of behavior from the nation of Israel, how was the Lord's pattern of behavior also reflected in these passages? (Even in the midst of Israel's unfaithfulness, God still responded with faithfulness. He relentlessly pursues His rebellious children.)
- 3. How is God trying to turn His people back to Him as evidenced in the recounting of events by Samuel? How would it be unloving of God to tolerate their wickedness? (God uses discipline to bring about the repentance of the Israelites. Ignoring sinful behavior would convey acceptance and therefore be unloving.)
- 4. What is God looking for from His people? What are the nonnegotiable expectations that are to be reflected from a holy relationship and how are they evidenced in our life? (God is looking for cooperation. He expects them to fear, serve and obey Him.)

Have someone read 1 Samuel 12:16-25 out loud.

5. Do you think Israel was wrong in asking for a king? What did their request reveal about their view of God? (Their desire for an earthly ruler revealed their dissatisfaction with their heavenly King. They thought that a human king, like the other nations had, was more relatable and advantageous.)

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- 6. How are God's actions trying to teach the Israelites the proper view of fear for their life? How is the Israelites perspective of fear evidenced in their request for a king and therefore different from God's intended purpose of it? Use Exodus 20:18-20 for insight. (God desires for His people to fear Him, as in feeling awe of Him and reverent respect, which in turn would keep them from sinning. It would overshadow any human fears because of the power and glory evidenced by God would give His people confidence in Him.)
- 7. What earthly props/idols do we resort to rather than depend upon Jesus to meet our needs? It is easy to fault the Israelites yet we have just as many ways we use to seek guidance or comfort. (Israel may have resorted to an earthly king to rule over them but we can look to government, social norms, friends/family to determine our direction or satisfy our needs.)

ACTION STEP

Consider any areas of rebellion that keep recurring for you. Are you remorseful or repentant over these areas because only one has the power to break the cycles? In what ways are they hindering God being the One thing that drives everything in your life?

This week write down the things in your life you MUST repent of immediately. Prayerfully ask God to reveal the thing you most need to repent of, and are ignoring, then write it down too. Come to group next week ready to confess to just one person.
